President's Report

It is my privilege to report to our members and stakeholders the results of a particularly demanding year.

At the 1999 Annual General Meeting members voted in a significant change to the structure, direction and responsibilities required of the new Council and thereby the whole organisation. The members did not only require these changes but also by our sponsors. Both groups saw swimming and education needing a new level of professionalism and focus to constantly achieve the goals set.

I am pleased to report significant progress towards these goals has been achieved and our organisation can now build on a solid base. The changes required have been difficult and for a few this has left them feeling frustrated. For the majority who have achieved so much I would like to thank you all on behalf of Council, without you this complex organisation would not survive.

The Education Committee performed well with over 57,000 education resources being distributed to the community during the period. The huge contribution made by Bert Cotterill as Director of Swimming Education is to be applauded and we are pleased to see Bert continue his involvement in the sport. Swimming education is looking forward with confidence within the new structure.

The Swimsport Committee has achieved considerable success during a very difficult year. The Winter Opens at Wanganui were very successful and provided our swimmers with an early measure on their progress. The National Age Groups and Junior Championship produced some exceptional results which shows our young swimming talent is there and requires further nurturing to ultimately build our national team.

Late in March the focus of swimming shifted to the New Zealand Opens held in Auckland. These championships were exceptionally well run and provided an opportunity for our senior swimmers to contend Olympic selection.

The highlight of the international calendar was the hosting of the third Oceania Swimming Championships in Christchurch. These championships brought together the nations of Oceania in an exciting 4 day championships. Bill Matson and the Christchurch organising committee produced an exceptional programme which was well represented by the athletes and senior officials from around the pacific. These Championships also hosted the President of Fina, Mr Mustapha Laurfaoui, which was an honour for our organisation.

The role of our National Coach and the contribution of Brett Naylor was exceptional. Brett undertook this role with enthusiasm and dedication, despite having a limited budget which frustrated his ability to expand the programme as far as its potential.

At the end of the year we received a resignation from New Zealand's greatest swimmer, Danyon Loader. Danyon's contribution to the sport both as an athlete and a role model has been quite exceptional. We wish Danyon well into the future and hope that he may continue his participation in the sport in some role into the future.

Since January of this year the organisation has been dealing with a serious drug infraction issue. This matter is not yet concluded and throughout the sport has gone to great lengths to ensure the athlete concerned has been given a fair opportunity to defend the infraction and ensure the principals of natural justice have prevailed. The sport fully upholds the

banning and abhorrence of drugs within our sport and will continue to assist with the education of our athletes.

This year Billy Fitzsimmons, life member, passed away at the age of 92. Billy retained her involvement and interest in swimming throughout the years, and it was with sadness that Swimming New Zealand farewelled Billy along with family and friends in March. It is inevitable that an organisation of over 100 years will see the passing of many young and not so young members, and this year there have been many. To the family and friends of all those no longer with us, Swimming New Zealand thanks you for allowing us to be part of their lives and you have our condolences.

Administration and Staffing

During the early part of the year the organisation was administered by Don Stanley in a caretaker role pending the appointment of a new Executive Director. Don did a good job in very difficult circumstances, we would like to thank him sincerely for his efforts during this difficult time.

In January the organisation appointed a full time Executive Director Catriona McBean, who immediately was confronted with a number of complex and challenging issues. Under Catriona's leadership the organisation has measurably improved on a number of fronts, all of which are positive for the future direction of the sport. In particular by working with Warwyck Dewe the organisation has now merged the two old organisations together, created a strong fiscal control over our financial systems, and introduced fiscal accountability to ensure the future of the sport has a sound foundation to grow from.

Executive Director's Report

This year has been indicative of organisational transition and change as a consequence of the amalgamation of the three predecessors - Swimming New Zealand, Swimming Education New Zealand, and SCAT. Those dealing directly with Swimming New Zealand have been supportive through this period, recognising that a new executive director with new staff in a new organisation requires time to establish systems and procedures to provide effective and efficient service.

Support from partners – Hillary Commission, New Zealand Sports Foundation and Water Safety New Zealand – has continued throughout the transition. Not only have these partners continued to provide financial support for Swimming New Zealand, their advice and technical support has been invaluable to the establishment of an organisation suited to the 21st century.

adidas, Air New Zealand and Lotto continue to support Swimming New Zealand's endeavours both in competition and education. Without the commitment from external stakeholders, the business of swimming would be made far more difficult. I thank all our partners for their ongoing support.

The offices of Swimming New Zealand moved in January to share with Water Safety New Zealand, as well as be alongside Surf Life Saving New Zealand. This arrangement has been very well received by both Swimming New Zealand and Water Safety New Zealand staff alike. Operationally, the relocation provided an opportunity to implement new systems and procedures which have resulted in our ability to service members more efficiently and effectively.

Staff changes within education resulted in review and assessment of the structure and better alignment of the delivery of education programmes with to identified needs. The range of education courses from Lotto SwimSafe through to coaching Level 3 provides opportunities for all involved in swimming to undertake professional development. Continued focus on education priorities for each sector ensures that the programmes syllabi remain current and appropriate.

The last twelve months have seen many successes, no less the naming of nine swimmers to represent New Zealand at the Sydney 2000 Olympics. Results in the pool indicate that although a number of swimmers have announced their retirement during the year, the prospects for continued development of the high performance programme is favourable. Danyon Loader's retirement represents the culmination of over 13 years international competition at the highest level for which Danyon was recognised at the Halberg Awards as the Sportsman of the Decade 1990s.

Success in the running of the national meets this year is tribute to the hard work by all involved. Swimmers at all levels have been provided opportunities throughout the country to participate in training camps, allowing swimmers to train under the National Coach. The ongoing support of Otago University School of Physical Education High Performance Centre in providing expert advice and support for swimmers utilising the flume is unparalleled.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge the support and commitment of all the staff. Without these individuals, the ability of Swimming New Zealand to provide the services to swimmers, clubs, centres, and the community at large would be limited.

Swimming New Zealand is now looking forward to the forthcoming years as a responsive and responsible organisation actively promoting swimming opportunities at all levels. With continued support from partners and commitment from those involved at all levels of the sport, swimming will be in a position to meet these requirements.

SwimSport Committee Report

It gives me great pleasure to present the 1999-2000 report - the millennium report - on behalf of the SwimSport Committee. I do so reluctantly following the recent resignation of our Chair Kathy Mildon.

Kathy is the third Chair of SwimSport in as many years. Each has made a significant contribution to our sport and Kathy was no exception, working tirelessly over the past 12 months to help steer swimming in the direction we believe will benefit everyone involved in our sport.

Her resignation and that of her predecessors is another example of the pressures that today's sport places on its amateur administrators. It is not easy to hold positions of responsibility on sports bodies - the demands are immense. It is a situation a number of our national sports face. For instance one high profile national sport is facing significant financial difficulties. In another instance a long time administrator of a sport has been forced to resign because of a decision he took.

With this trend in mind, it is important that our membership take a more responsible position in how it reacts to issues and how their elected representatives deal them with. Our Council, the various committees and the administration need support and advice from members - not criticism.

There is no denying that this has been a challenging year, bringing with it an array of issues. The most time consuming were those that made media headlines and provoked the most reaction from members, were ironically issues, that were not directly related to SwimSport, but were forced upon us because of outside influences. With such limited time from volunteer administrators, these issues deflected our attention from our development plans.

Despite this our committee has made significant advances including:

- Developing for the future within an entirely new administration structure
- Overcoming the constraints of severe budget cuts from the Hillary Commission
- Working within the constraints of the severe funding cuts and helping to bring about a significant financial turnaround in our finances.
- Working with our first fulltime national coach to put in place many pathways for the development of our sport.
- Establishing a new Junior Development Programme
- Working closely with our new executive director to establish our strategic plans and new operating procedures.
- Established stronger working relations with the Education Committee, Technical Committee, SCAT, Paralympics New Zealand, and the media.

The efforts of our National Coach and the programmes involving hard work from a number of people has led to much improved results from our elite swimmers. This has resulted in nine swimmers qualifying for the Sydney Olympics, with eight of them 20 years old or younger, and a 20 percent increase in our funding from the New Zealand Sports Foundation for the forthcoming year.

While it has been a challenging year, swimming has laid a solid foundation for the future. The systems are in place. The challenge is to consolidate over the next 12 months, develop resources to allow our best swimmers to stay in the pool and continue to develop with an international programme. This will help the National Coach build towards the 2002 Commonwealth Games in Manchester and the 2004 Olympic Games in Athens with a newfound confidence.

Education Committee Report

The past year has been difficult for the committee and staff. We have tried to deal with numerous problems including an 75 percent staff turnover within a three month period.

Anne McLeod resigned in December 1999. Swimming education lost a very valued, highly skilled Lotto SwimSafe Development Manager.

Bert Cotterill retired in February 2000. Bert's contribution to swimming education, sport and SCAT has been outstanding and a huge loss to this organisation. The wealth of experience and knowledge Bert and Anne held benefitted many many swim teachers and coaches. Amy McDermott resigned in January 2000 and we were without a replacement for a month. This also impacted on the central region.

Swimming education acknowledges the commitment and dedication displayed by these staff members, thanks them and wishes them every success.

Mark Saunders position with swimming education was upgraded to National Education Manager in March 2000. The committee thanks Mark, Lotto SwimSafe Development Managers, and our Lotto SwimSafe and SwimFantastic tutors for their ongoing commitment to swimming education.

Attendance at the courses this year has seen over 3335 attend the courses and over 210 certificate modules taken by correspondence. Over 57,600 education resources have been distributed to the community in the last twelve months. The Education Committee congratulates coaches who have completed certification requirements.

Excellent communication exists with the Chair of SwimSport Committee Kathy Mildon, although both committees focus on separate issues. The role of the Swimming New Zealand Council has yet to be identified or established to give added value. Once established, it will provide a forum for committees.

The committee would like to see a review of the Lotto SwimSafe course and a reduction in Lotto SwimSafe course costs to members on Swimming New Zealand.

Our purpose is to create an environment of positive learning. To encourage and provide improved teaching and coaching skills. If children learn to swim in a positive environment they may not only learn a life skill but enjoy swimming as a sport.

I thank the committee for their dedication and total support. Swimming education acknowledges and thanks Water Safety New Zealand for the funding support given, and Lotto for the ongoing sponsorship and to the funding provided by the Hillary Commission.

Technical Committee Report

The Technical Committee convened on 10 occasions during the year. Four meetings were held and the remainder of the business conducted via teleconference.

The Committee worked well during the year and adopted an agenda to review a number of aspects relating to the certification and growth path for technical officials. Progress with this work is well advanced with a review of the Rules relating to swimming issued in December 1999, and updated examination and officials manuals currently in final draft. The criteria and pre-qualification period have also been reviewed for adoption at the time of the new examination format.

Two Fina officials seminars were held during the year offering opportunities for officials to familiarise themselves with current rules and procedures used by Fina. The first seminar in Wellington received support from Swimming New Zealand to allow a new generation of officials to become familiar with national and international practices. The second, held in Christchurch during the Oceania Championships included a significant participation from Oceania Federations in addition to New Zealand officials.

These clinics proved very worthwhile and provided an opportunity for the Committee to obtain feedback from officials and identify priorities for the committee's work. Communication proved a significant concern and the committee has been working with regional coordinators and the National Office to try and improve communication to officials in their regions.

Swimming New Zealand was fortunate to have members appointed to officiate at the World Short Course Championships (John West) , and the forthcoming Sydney Olympic Summer Games (Ross Bragg), and subsequent Paralympic Games (Ross Bragg and Kerry Head). A number of New Zealand officials also officiated in senior roles at the Oceania Championships in Christchurch.

Five officials from New Zealand attended the IVth Fina World Officials Seminar held in Sydney in January and contributed well in that forum. Participation in events such as this offers additional opportunity to meet with officials from other federations, learn from one another, and agree common practices and procedures for the conduct of competitions, which benefits our competitors in developing standard methodologies for all international competitions.

I wish to thank the committee for their contribution and assistance to me over the year. Colin Kennedy has served on the Technical Committee for many years and will retire at this Annual Meeting. I wish to record my thanks and that of the committee for Colin's contribution both in the technical sphere and to swimming in New Zealand.

Much work remains in the forthcoming season to complete the agenda the committee has set itself and it is intended that this work will be progressively completed and presented to members as the season progresses.

National Coach's Report

This year has seen many positive moves for swimming in New Zealand and yet has been tinged with many frustrations for me.

The many changes in the Swimming New Zealand office have required new system integration and job information learning. This has caused much disruption and yet has really been unavoidable.

It has been my pleasure to work with the swimmers at all levels. The camps from regional through to national level have been a tremendous success not only for the swimmers but also for the coaches who attended. I believe we must continue these camps twice a year for each of the four levels and ensure that the stroke camps are back in the plan.

Without exception the staff on all camps and tours this year have been excellent. The total support and commitment made by staff is an essential part in giving athletes the opportunity to achieve their potential.

Although numbers at some national meets this year have increased we still need to actively promote and sell our sport at regional and national level. Ian Hepenstall's involvement as media liaison is a positive step in the right direction.

Funding is always an ongoing issue but we must work to increase funding for elite athletes to keep them in our sport.

There are a number of problems we face in our sport today. The two main issues I believe we must continue to work on are:

- Regional Development - Some areas have pulled together injecting time, energy and funds at provincial level. The rewards will come for these regions who are working together, setting up training camps and giving the young swimmers appropriate support to keep them in the sport to national and international level. This is the future of swimming in New Zealand and we all have a responsibility to make it work.
- Create a pathway and follow it. I still see too many big egos and emotions getting in the way of achieving the big picture. We need to all agree on the pathway and then work together for the swimmers and the future success of our sport.

My thanks to the SwimSport Committee and the national office for their support.
